


Flatland p14: For whenever the temper of the Women is thus exasperated...

An appeal against female suffrage: Were women admitted to this struggle, their natural eagerness and quickness of temper would probably make them hotter partisans than men. as their political relations stand at present, they tend to check in them the disposition to partisanship, and to strengthen in them the qualities of sympathy and disinterestedness. We believe that their admission to the suffrage would precisely reverse this condition of things, and that the whole nation would suffer in consequence.


